
When the messengers returned to Jacob, they said, "We went to your brother Esau. He is coming to meet you, and he is bringing 400 men with him."





Jacob replied, "Not until you bless me."


"What is your name?" the man asked.


Jacob began walking with a limp because the man had dislocated his hip. He looked up and saw Esau and the 400 men coming toward him.



Jacob made sure that all of his servants were in the front part of his group, that Leah and her sons were behind them, and that Rachel and Joseph were behind them.




Jacob went on ahead and bowed to the ground seven times as he approached his brother.

Jacob introduced his wives and children to Esau saying, "These are the children God has graciously given to your servant."




Esau asked, "What's the meaning of all these flocks and herds that I met along the way when I was coming to you?"

Jacob replied, "They were meant to find your favor, my lord."


"But, I already have enough," Esau said.

Later, Esau departed and went back to Edom.





God came to him a second time and said, "Remember, your name is no longer Jacob, it is Israel. May your family multiply greatly here."




Later, they set out from Bethel. Rachel was pregnant with her second child during the journey. When they arrived at Ephrath, which would later become Bethlehem, she had the baby.
