
Abram obeyed God and set off for the land of Canaan with all his things. He also brought some of his family—his wife Sarai, his father Terah, and his nephew Lot.



After traveling from Ur they stopped in a place called Haran and settled there for a short time. While they were there, Abram's father, Terah, died.




After his father died, God told Abram to continue on his journey to the land of Canaan. By this time he was 75 years old.






The LORD appeared to Abram and told him, "I will give this land to your descendants." So, Abram built an altar to the LORD at Shechem and worshipped Him there.




Abram and all those who were with him traveled south to a place called Bethel where he set up his tent. He built another altar to God, and he continued calling on the LORD and praying to Him.




Just as Abram was getting settled, a famine started in the land. A famine is when it does not rain for a long time and the food stops growing. Many people and animals were very hungry.




Because the famine was so bad, Abram and his family decided that they should travel further south. They went through the desert and into the land of Egypt to find food.






He summoned Abram and said, "What have you done to me? Why didn't you tell me that she was your wife? Take her and get out of here!"
