


After Deborah's victory against King Jabin of the Canaanites, Israel had peace for 40 years.





Gideon turned to Him and said, "If I have found favor with you, please give me a sign so that I'll know that you are really the LORD."




The voice of the LORD spoke to Gideon saying, "Be at peace. Don't be afraid. Nothing will happen to you."

So Gideon built an altar there and called it "The Lord is Peace."



So Gideon took 10 of his servants and did exactly as the LORD asked him to do. They worked secretly at night because Gideon feared getting caught by his family and the people of the town.





When the men of the town got up the next morning, they found that the altar of Baal and the Asherah pole next to it had both been destroyed.


They said to Gideon's father, Joash, "Bring out your son. He must die since he tore down Baal's altar.

However, Joash said, "If Baal is really a god, then he should be the one to come against my son." So Gideon was allowed to live.




All of the Midianites, Amalekites, and Qedemites came together after crossing the Jordan River and camped in the Jezreel Valley.


