

Joseph was thirty years old when he entered Pharaoh's service. Very soon, the land began producing a wonderful crop, just as Joseph said it would.


Joseph traveled all throughout the land of Egypt to make sure the extra food was being gathered up. During the seven years of plenty, he built storehouses to keep the food safe for later.




Joseph stored up so much food that he eventually stopped counting how much was coming in. It became impossible to measure—like sand on a seashore.



The seven years of plenty came to an end just as Joseph said it would. It was followed by seven years of horrible famine.




The famine wasn't only in Egypt; it was also in all the surrounding lands. Nevertheless, there was plenty of food in Egypt because Joseph had stored it away.




The people cried out to Pharaoh for food, so he told them, "Go to Joseph and do whatever he tells you."


So, all the brothers prepared for the journey except the youngest brother, Benjamin. Jacob was worried about his safety and would not let him go.

They came and bowed down before him. When they did this, Joseph remembered his dream from years ago.


He decided to treat them very harshly. "Where do you come from?" he demanded.



"We are from the land of Canaan," they replied. "We are here to buy food."


"I don't believe you," Joseph said. "I think you are spies! You have come to see if our land has any weaknesses."

They replied saying, "No, we are your servants. We are the sons of one man living in Canaan. We were twelve brothers. The youngest is with our father and one is no longer living."



So, Joseph imprisoned them for three days.




Joseph turned back to them and gave orders to have Simeon bound before their eyes and taken to prison. He would be the one who stayed behind.
