

Story 20: Joseph Reunites with His Family Genesis 43-46

Story 20: Joseph Reunites with His Family Genesis 43-46







Then, Joseph saw his youngest brother Benjamin, and he was overcome with emotion. He left them and went into another room to cry.




When he had regained his composure, he washed his face, and came back out. Then, he told his servants to begin serving the meal.

His brothers sat in the order of their age. When they were served their food, Benjamin received five times as much as any of the other brothers.





When he did this, the brothers replied, "How could we steal from your master? If the cup is found in any of our bags, that brother must die and the rest of us will become your master's slaves.





When they arrived, Joseph told them, "I will not punish you all, but the brother whose bag that the cup was found must become my slave."




Judah pleaded, "Please take my life in place of the boy! Our father loves our youngest brother so much that if he hears that something has happened to him, he will die.




He finally spoke saying, "I am Joseph! Is my father still living?" But, his brothers were terrified and unable to answer him.






Joseph's brothers returned to their father and said, "Our brother is alive! Joseph is ruling over the land of Egypt."




So Jacob set out with all that he had—his children, grandchildren, and all his flocks and herds.
