





God spoke to Abram in a vision. He said, "Do not be afraid Abram. I am like a shield to you. I am your very great reward."




Even though Abram didn't know how God would do it, he believed what God told him. And the LORD was pleased with Abram because he believed. So Abram's faith made him right with God.



But Abram said, "My Lord and King, how can I know that I will have this land as my own?"


So the LORD said to him, "Bring me a young cow, a goat, and a ram. Each must be three years old. Bring a dove and a young pigeon too."




Abram brought all of the animals to the LORD. Abram cut them into two pieces and placed the pieces side by side with a path in the middle, but he did not cut the birds in half.




